Keynote Speaker



Dr. Nathaniel B. PerezGordon College
Executive Director of Diversity,
Community, and Belonging

Dr. Nathaniel Perez serves as the Executive Director for the Office of Diversity, Community, and Belonging at Gordon College. His role positions him as a key leader in shaping the college's culture and creating a greater sense of belonging among the growing diverse community at Gordon College. Through his leadership, Dr. Perez oversees a variety of initiatives including faculty and staff development, diverse and inclusive hiring practices, policy formation, and the cultivation of strategic partnerships that can support these goals.

His role extends beyond administrative oversight to include fostering meaningful community engagement, ensuring that efforts around diversity and belonging are integrated into the fabric of campus life, and that all members of the Gordon College community can thrive both personally and professionally.

Prior to moving to Massachusetts, Dr. Perez served as the Associate Dean of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion/Director for the Center for Racial Reconciliation at Alliance University (formerly Nyack College). He earned his Doctor of Ministry and his Master of Divinity at Alliance Theological Seminary. In addition to being on the pastoral staff of churches in Westchester County, New York, and Bergen County, New Jersey, Dr. Perez has also served as a church planter and as pastor of a multi-ethnic church in White Plains, New York.

With a vision to inspire a new generation of leaders, Dr. Perez has taught several courses related to race, diversity, justice, spiritual formation, and reconciliation on college campuses and in prison education programs. He has also facilitated special forums, panel discussions, small groups, seminars, and conferences. Dr. Perez also serves as a Diversity Commissioner for the Council for Christian Colleges and Universities (CCCU).

Challenging Cultural Blindness in Schools

Algonquin Regional High School's Cultural Enrichment Club is a student-led organization that celebrates the diverse cultures within the school, community, and beyond. Recognizing the rise of culture blindness and racial discrimination among students and faculty, the club prioritizes educating the community to build an inclusive environment and combat systemic racism. This workshop will feature a discussion of the club's goals and history, an interactive identity wheel and belonging walk activity, and a conversation about how students and organizations can enhance cultural awareness and combat discrimination in their school communities. By engaging participants in understanding how their environment and experiences shape their identities, this workshop will prepare participants to challenge cultural assumptions, address racial discrimination, and promote awareness in their school communities.

The Power of Identity

Social Media and Social Justice

Over the last 10 years, hate speech on social media platforms has caused immense damage. Because of the business models of social media companies, hate and outrage is often highly recommended and pushed by their algorithms, resulting in a spike in hate speech online and offline. This workshop is in part to generate awareness as to how and why these platforms have spread outrage and hate for their own gain. However, there is much we can do about this. This workshop will also serve to provide individual and collective action we can take to limit the spread of this type of content, to showcase examples of individuals and marginalized communities that have stood up and used these platforms to advance social justice and enact real positive change, and to provide a roadmap for how to hold platforms accountable for promoting inflammatory content.

DEIB in Sports: Building Inclusive and Equitable Athletic Programs

This presentation dives into Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) within sports, exploring how athletic programs can be intentionally structured to foster inclusivity and equity for all athletes. It addresses the unique challenges and opportunities within sports environments, examining both visible and invisible barriers to participation and the steps coaches, administrators, and athletes can take to create a more welcoming culture. Key topics include promoting equitable access to resources, representing diverse identities and backgrounds, and creating a sense of belonging for every athlete. This session will be valuable for players, coaches, athletic directors, and school administrators; providing insights into the importance of DEIB in: fostering team unity, enhancing athlete development, cultivating leadership skills and building a more inclusive athletic community.

Bystander Intervention Training: Strategies for Successful Disruption of Harassment

This workshop provides the "5Ds" (direct, delay, delegate, document, distract) as strategies to disrupt an incident of harassment in addition to examining the ways that power dynamics related to a victim's visible identities come into play during incidents of harassment. The workshop starts by defining the history of bystander intervention, why it's important, and the negative mental, physical, and collective effects of harassment as a public health concern. It then uses a video of a real life harassment incident as an example, covers the five strategies, and provides opportunities for participants to think through how to apply the five strategies if they were in the situation that the video portrays. Most importantly, the workshop ends with four scenarios that take place in a school setting based off of real life incidents that the student presenters have witnessed or experienced and facilitates a discussion regarding how to apply these strategies.









