Please provide a brief description of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School, commonly known as BVT, is located in Upton, Massachusetts. There are approximately 1,200 students enrolled, representing grades 9-12. BVT serves students from 13 surrounding towns in the Blackstone Valley including Bellingham, Blackstone, Douglas, Grafton, Hopedale, Mendon, Milford, Millbury, Millville, Northbridge, Sutton, Upton, and Uxbridge. BVT has a reputation of being a diverse and inclusive school that excels in academic programs, as well as its vocational shops. BVT offers 18 diverse vocational programs. BVT has received numerous accolades for its continued support and generosity to not only our school, but to its community and the Blackstone Valley.

What are the purpose and objectives of the project (What were you trying to acccomplish)? The Coloring Packages activity was created in an effort to involve our student council in community service activities to benefit not only our school, but the community of people who need our help. We wanted to engage our council in an activity that made them feel a part of something bigger and would show them the meaning of acts of kindness. One of our goals is to support our community in their hardships, and this fun activity was a great way for us to do this. Our executive board wanted our council to participate in service activity that we could do in the comfort of our own school. We came up with the idea of the Coloring Packages that could be done with small or large groups of students anywhere in our school. Our goal for this activity was to benefit the children receiving treatment at UMass Hospital in Worcester, MA, by giving them a fun activity to take their mind off their hospital stay and know that people are thinking about them. The coloring packages were created by having one member from our student council color one page, write a thoughtful note with a positive message to the child on the back of their finished colored page, and then put an identical blank coloring page into the package with a pack of crayons, so the child could have a friend that they were essentially coloring with. This activity allowed our student council to get together and socialize while coloring to support the children who were facing challenges in the hospital. This also showed the children that they are not alone and are cared for and that the BVT Student Council supports them. We were able to connect with the Child Life Specialist at UMASS, who's son is a BVT student, to ask if they would accept these packages. She immediately said yes and came to get them the day after our meeting.

The Coloring Package activity was meant to engage the BVT student council members in a fun and rewarding activity that would benefit our community in a unique and meaningful way. The students at the meeting loved this activity, especially having the opportunity to socialize with their friends and other members, while doing a fun activity that benefited children in need. The simple activity of coloring showed our members that even the smallest acts of kindness and service can make a world of difference for someone else. After the meeting, the students commented that they hoped to have similar activities in the future and showed interest in doing this activity again, but perhaps with a seasonal or holiday spin to it. The student from BVT connected us with his mom, who is the Child Life Specialist mentioned above, forming a relationship between other BVT students, helping our council achieve our goal. The Coloring Package activity also involved the community in regard to how the student council worked with a hospital that serves the community where the 13 towns that go to BVT are located. This showed our council and the community the meaning of kindness and support for one another, no matter the situation or circumstances. After only week, the Child Life specialist informed us that all of the coloring packages were gone and that the kids loved them, requesting more of them. She also shared with us how excited they were to hang up their new drawings in their rooms and the fact that they had made a new friend. She commented that the Staff at UMass loved this collaboration and idea from our council and look forward to continuing to bring joy to the lives of these children.

This project engaged our students and many members of the community at large and we look forward to doing it again!

# Please provide a brief description of the school and community:

Clinton is a tight-knit and supportive community where everyone looks out for one another. Clinton High School is deeply rooted in this culture of care, with a strong reputation for giving back. Located in Worcester County, the town has a proud history of a hard working immigrant population that continues to shape its identity.

Currently, over half of the students in Clinton Public Schools come from low-income households, highlighting the importance of community support. The Student Council plays a vital role in meeting these needs through initiatives like blood drives, food drives, and The Gaels Giving Tree, the focus of this nomination.

In addition, Clinton benefits from the WHEAT Community Connections program, which provides essential services and food to low-income families in the area. The Student Council collaborates closely with WHEAT, particularly in its food drives and holiday Giving Tree initiative, to make a meaningful difference for those in need.

What are the purpose and objectives of the project (What were you trying to accomplish)? The purpose of the Gaels Giving Tree was to bring joy and hope to children in need during the holiday season. The idea for this project began when Julia Parenteau, the Student Council President, noticed a troubling pattern while working with kindergartners at the elementary school. Stories like, "My parents said Santa didn't come to our house because he knew we were sick and wanted to let us rest," revealed the difficult realities some children faced during the holidays.

Motivated by a desire to ensure no child felt forgotten during this special time of year, Julia, along with Sadie Mendez, Grace Alvarado, and Jenna Dumais, launched the Gaels Giving Tree in November 2023. The project was an instant success, collecting and distributing gifts to children in need and inspiring even more community involvement. This year, the initiative grew even further, providing over 100 gifts for children ranging from infancy to 16 years old.

Our objectives were clear:

- To ensure no child in the community felt left out during the holiday season.
- To demonstrate the power of collective action, showing Clinton and its surrounding towns that coming together can create lasting, positive change.
- To uplift children and families, by providing joy and a sense of belonging.

In its first two years, the Gaels Giving Tree has far exceeded expectations, becoming a cherished tradition in Clinton. It has not only fulfilled its goals but also established a foundation for many successful years ahead, ensuring every child has a brighter holiday season.

Members work closely with WHEAT and Clinton Elementary School to gather information about children and their holiday wishes. They also promote the project, collect and label gifts, and deliver the donations to the WHEAT center. Their dedication and enthusiasm shine throughout the process, as highlighted by a volunteer's email praising their "joy in giving."

Students outside the council also play a role in the success of this project. For instance, the Transition Vision Studio (TVS), which is our Life Skills program, sets up and decorates the Giving Tree, creating a festive and welcoming display. Additionally, students across Clinton High School participate by taking ornaments and donating gifts, furthering the project's reach.

Faculty and administration support the initiative by spreading awareness, participating in gift donations, and encouraging students to get involved. Their leadership reinforces the value of community service and ensures the project runs smoothly.

The entire Clinton community acts as a key stakeholder in the Gaels Giving Tree. Community members, including families, local organizations, and volunteers, donate gifts and provide vital support. The WHEAT Community Connections program plays an essential role by helping the council identify families in need. This partnership, along with the generosity of staff, students, and residents, exemplifies the strong, united spirit of Clinton.

One heartwarming highlight this year came from a WHEAT volunteer who shared their admiration for the Student Council: "They showed us photos of the Giving Tree and shared stories of students asking for more families to collect gifts for. This is the spirit of CHS!"

Duxbury High School is a public high school that prepares students for the rigors of post-secondary education, the workforce, and service at local, national, and global levels. As students mature through high school, they work to develop empathy and respect for themselves, others, and the world around them as communicators and collaborators, engaged citizens, empowered and healthy individuals, and resilient and flexible learners.

This year, Duxbury High School is comprised of eight hundred twelve students and over one hundred teachers, support staff, and administrators. Duxbury High School offers an extensive co-curricular program. Approximately seventy-five percent of the student body participates in at least one of the thirty-four athletic teams and sixty percent of the student body participates in at least one of the fifty-plus co-curricular clubs offered. The community is proud of the extensive academic, athletic, music, arts, and leadership programs offered at Duxbury High School.

Duxbury High School is located in Duxbury, Massachusetts, a historic, seaside community located about thirty-five miles south of Boston with a population of approximately sixteen thousand residents. Duxbury offers excellent educational opportunities, recreational activities, and town services. The community of DHS is a testament to the close-knit nature of our town. Duxbury prides itself on its natural beauty and historic landmarks, making it a destination in the seasonal months. The traffic from tourists has influenced Duxbury to emerge as a hub for small shops and restaurants, many being artisanal pizzerias. Duxbury and its surrounding towns have a total of thirty-four pizza parlors, encouraging many of its residents to eat out and socialize.

What are the purpose and objectives of the project (What were you trying to accomplish)? The main purpose of our Pizza Bowl was to bring the DHS and Duxbury community together over a shared meal, while also raising money for our selected charity of the year, The Jimmy Fund. Students, faculty, and community members took advantage of the opportunity to converse over pizza for this worthy cause.

The objective of this project was rooted in unity. We hoped to bring together the larger Duxbury community while also raising funds for The Jimmy Fund. We also wanted to provide local businesses with the chance to donate and strengthen their business recognition in town. This program strengthened the relationship between DHS students and local businesses, while also helping improve student leaders' interpersonal skills because they had to contact local vendors, hand out the pizza, and interact with community members.

- 1. We utilized the entirety of our Student Council for this initiative. Our general Student Council was encouraged to participate in a variety of tasks necessary for the success of the project. Our STUCO Executive Board played a crucial role in engaging local restaurants by personally reaching out to these businesses and encouraging them to donate pizza. Additionally, these students picked up the donated pizza and helped to hand it out to patrons. Other Student Council members helped to set up for the event. The majority of our Student Council delegation was on hand to interact with community members. The event was advertised on our social media platforms and in schoolwide newsletters. We also followed up with an article in the local newspaper, the Duxbury Clipper to announce the winner and to thank all of the businesses that donated pizza.
- 2. Other students across DHS helped by spreading the word about our event and encouraging family and friends to attend, which paid off in the end as we raised over \$2300 for The Jimmy Fund. Our Jazz Band attended the event and performed for forty-five minutes; this not only showcased their talent but also brought joy to all of those in attendance. DHS students supported the event by purchasing tickets and attending with their friends and family.
- 3. The faculty at Duxbury Public Schools played a pivotal role in supporting our event as they showed up with family and friends! Many of them told their neighbors about the event which increased ticket sales.
- 4. The Duxbury community was key to the success of this new initiative. It was critical that our local pizza businesses donated pizza and some attended the event to hand out their delicious product. Families across the district were on hand to taste and to judge the event. The social group, Duxbury Moms, also assisted through advertising on their social media platform.

Please provide a brief description of the school and community:

Greenfield High School is an 8-12 building located in Western Mass. Greenfield is the heart of Franklin County and many local events happen in our community. Though we are a technically a city, we continue to hold to small town norms where we all know one another and work as a collective unit. Our high school currently has 483 students enrolled. This number will decrease significantly next year as the 8th grade moves back to the middle school.

What are the purpose and objectives of the project (What were you trying to accomplish)? Miracle Minute - A week before the start of school a senior at GHS was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer. His family needed to leave their jobs in order to stay with Tyler has he traveled back and forth to Worcester, this is an hour an half commute. The abrupt diagnosis prior to the start of school meant that none of the students had an opportunity to see him before he started his treatments. This project aimed to raise the necessary funds to help his family travel back and forth to the hospital and to allow Tyler to know that his school community was behind him all the way, even when he couldn't see them in person.

At a pep rally the week before Tyler's friends and siblings went on stage to share the details of the Miracle Minute which would take place the following week. A video of them speaking was also posted on social media and various members of the community also sent in money. Friday, October 4. for one minute we played Unstoppable by Sia over the load speaker while all classroom collected money from participating students and staff in each room. Members of the student council, along with some of Tyler's closest friends, counted the money as it came in and were overwhelmed that in one minute we collected over \$2000.

Purpose - To raise as much money in one minute as possible to donate to a student in need. The goal was \$1000.

Student Council - made posters for school and social media. The council included the explanation of the project during the pep rally. Members distributed and collected the envelopes of money

# Please provide a brief description of the school and community:

Our high school is a regional school for 2 vastly different towns. Hampden is a rural, densely populated town while Wilbraham is a suburban town bordering our largest city in Western Mass. For the last several years, our school district has tried to bring the children from both towns together for middle and high school. This created a division between our towns and schools (those in Hampden and those in Wilbraham). Hampden has 1 school building (Pre-K-5) while Wilbraham has 5 buildings (K-12). Not only is there a divide among our students and families, but also between those who teach in Hampden vs. Wilbraham. Our district office has worked to lessen the divide in recent years by bringing teachers across the district together to meet monthly to discuss curriculum alignment. This has helped foster relationships between teachers in all of our buildings.

What are the purpose and objectives of the project (What were you trying to accomplish)? The purpose of Project Santa was to provide an opportunity for our District staff and their families to come together during the holiday season. As a student council we strive to build stronger, more wholesome relationships with our community. The perfect opportunity arose when reviewing an older, less popular craft event. We altered and revised an event that was previously offered only to the staff at Minnechaug and extended it to our entire district staff. The goal of Santa was to provide craft stations, a Santa meet-and-greet, and most importantly, holiday spirit to the children and families of the entire faculty in our district. Children moved from station to station while waiting for their family's turn to meet Santa, district employees were able to chat with their colleagues in an informal and relaxed setting.

Please provide a brief explanation of involvement of the following (if applicable): 1) Student Council Community

Student Council Members: The size of the event required all of our whole council to be present and active. An array of ugly sweaters, holiday hats, and smiling faces was the true game changer for our project, exciting the Members 2) Other Students 3) Faculty 4) kids and elevating the positivity. Members were assigned different work stations to ensure the event flowed smoothly. Some stations included ornament decorating, bracelet designing, wood painting, and picture taking. Council members were also invited to take part in our infamous cookie contest adding some extra fun and competitiveness.

> Faculty: The faculty of our entire school district was invited to attend Santa, which had never been done before. The large number of our faculty made this decision difficult but we were ready to tackle any numbers thrown our way. We ended up having about 25 district employees and around 50 children attend the event. The faculty that went were welcomed to take time to chat with colleagues while their children or young family members spent time with the council doing crafts, or adults could choose to help their child at any of the stations. Members of the faculty enjoyed their quality time with our student council and their family, making memories and new connections. The feedback we received from those who attended was very positive. One 5th grade teacher wrote, "this was the absolute best! A BIG thank you to all of the student council members and advisors who did all the behind the scenes work! My girls absolutely loved it." An employee at the high school who brought her grandchildren wrote, "What a wonderful event! Please thank all of the students who helped and participated."

Community: The community impact was much larger than we had ever hoped. Families and friends were appreciative of the event and positive feedback had spread guickly. New bonds were formed between children, council members, and faculty all tracing back to this single event. Countless smiles and conversations exchanged out in public and back at the school have opened our eyes to seeing the influence we have when taking time to go the extra mile in our planning and always prioritizing giving back to our community.

Please provide a brief description of the school and community:	Westborough high school is a public school in Westborough Massachusetts right outside of Worcester. The school obtains about 1200 students and almost 250 faculty members. The town of Westborough is made up of around 22,000 residents. Our school offers college-preparatory courses, AP classes, and a wide range of extracurriculars. Westborough high school serves to promote inclusivity and encourages students to become leaders. Westborough High School Student Council is made up of 74 members and 11 Executive Board Officers, all of whom are driven to keep the school and community an enjoyable and welcoming environment for all.

What are the purpose and objectives of the project (What were you trying to accomplish)? One of our main goals was to help expose students to the feeling of giving back to the community. We presented charity week to the school in hope to bring everyone together and inspire students to want to be more involved in giving back. We chose the Kyle Cares foundation to raise money for because of what they are dedicated to. They, "promote open and honest communication about the mental health challenges experienced by teens and young adults in today's society." With students being constantly stressed and struggling with mental health due to grades, tests, and other outside of school challenges, we felt that choosing a program that related to all students in our school would motivate them to put more effort into the fundraising events. Student council wanted the student body to really get involved in the series of fundraisers. The events we ran were not only for the purpose of giving back, but were also to excite students whether it be a student vs. faculty basketball game, or a race to see what class could bring in the most items for a necessities drive for donuts the following week. Our council achieved our goal of getting students involved and saw exceeding turnouts at all of the events. Students seemed to genuinely enjoy the events and at the end of the week it was clear they were inspired to continue to give back to the community. While helping raise money for the Kyle Cares organization, we wanted to help support our local food pantry which was in desperate need of donations due to the fact that they had an uprising of people in need. On top of that it was nearing thanksgiving, so the student council wanted to ensure that the people got what they needed to enjoy the holiday. Throughout the duration of the week we had an ongoing necessity drive, where we encouraged students to bring in donations. After alerting the student body of the situation with the food pantry we noticed a spike in donations and realized that the pantry's disparity impacted students to do as much as they could. We wanted to give back to the community that has supported us students. This goal not only motivated members of our council but the entire student body which was evident when we totaled more than 400 pounds of goods donated.

- 1) Westborough High School Student Council members contributed to all of the events that ran through Charity Week through planning, setting up, and participating. With the weeks leading up to the events they all Members 2) Other Students 3) Faculty 4) brainstormed, advertised, and organized to ensure we could get as much involvement from the school and community as possible. The first event of the week was the Spelling Bee. Members of our council helped brainstorm words, and facilitated the competition. The following day the student-faculty basketball game took place whose outcome exceeded the council's expectations. We had dozens of members playing in the game or even coaching on the sidelines with their peers making up a part of the 250 players and spectators. Those who did not participate helped set up, run concessions, and clean up. The popularity of the game due to member advertising led to great revenue. Members went above and beyond to help run the Bake Sale on Thursday, they spent time outside of school baking a variety of appealing treats and ran the sales stand throughout the morning and break. The final event to wrap up the week was movie night, council members set up the projector and made snacks for the attendees to ensure the success of the event. The following week members collected all of the bags from teachers rooms that were left for the necessities drive. Before bringing the items to the food pantry, members totaled more than 400 pounds of goods all going to help people in need in our community.
  - 2) The students at Westborough high school are what truly made this week successful, with their continuous support. Students were the bulk of participants in the spelling bee, basketball game, and movie attendees. They also donated a majority of the goods for the necessities drive and purchased an outstanding amount of baked goods from the bake sales. The students enthusiasm for the basketball game is what sticks out the most. The players as well as many of the coaches were students and the bleachers were filled with the student body as if it was a Friday night varsity game. The students are what made the week successful and helped our council reach as many people in need as possible through the money and food we collected.
  - 3) Faculty involvement stemmed from their continuous support, with every event. The office staff helped with advertising by announcing events on the morning announcements and consistently sending emails throughout the week. They purchased countless baked goods, and competed against their students in the basketball game to raise money. The class with the most goods brought in through the necessity drive was promised a fun prize the following week from the student council, but many teachers even took it a step further and offered bonus points for quizzes and tests to encourage as many donations as possible. The custodial staff and front office also helped make all of these events possible by helping us clean up, organize the events.
  - 4) This project was largely successful due to the support we got from the community. The basketball game was reviewed in a segment by the Lobby Observer so people unable to attend could be updated from a recap of the

game. Families of students also made an effort to bring in goods to donate, showing the support stretched further than just westborough students and staff. Westborough Connects, a local nonprofit organization that works on bringing the community together, helped us. Throughout this year, we have been working with them to collaborate on events and help advertise each other's projects. They advertised for Charity Week which brought a lot more attention to the event than we could have hoped for. This support enabled our council to give back to the community that has done so much to support us as students.
